

MODULE 1 – FUNDAMENTALS OF WRITING FOR THE SCREEN

While screenwriting has its roots in ancient storytelling traditions, the advent of filmmaking and animation technology at the end of the 19th century transformed the writing we might experience in a theatrical play into a new document...a blueprint of sorts. Early scripts had to communicate to artists and technicians. They had to make sense for producers and financiers. And they also had to result in an end-product that moved audiences. This module focuses on the early history of the of the script form, while calling out the concepts and principles that writers rely on to this day. Many of screenwriting's original concepts endure to the present, while modern-day challenges put pressure on the formats that writers will work in tomorrow.

MODULE 2 – WRITING FOR FEATURE FILM

As movies grew from nickelodeons and shorts to full-fledged features, their writing had to evolve from rough stage direction and technical jargon to a document that could communicate to the group of professionals that shot the films. Writing movies is different from writing novels or poetry, as the script needs to excite and inspire hundreds of people before even making it to a theater. This module focuses on writing the feature film script, focusing on structure, character, theme, and tone. We also address how the feature film script is evolving in the face of global film production and new distribution models.

Long viewed as the less respected competitor to features, episodic storytelling has exploded in popularity, imagination, and quality in the 21st century, driven by new streaming technologies and writers' ability to reimagine the format. This module dives into writing for television and streaming screens, how it's different from its theatrical counterpart, and how writers should prepare their careers for this dynamic era.


MODULE 4 – WRITING FOR ANIMATION

The first animations actually predate the first live-action filmmaking of the 19th century. Even though it's older and requires a very different production process, animation is (incorrectly) considered a *genre* of filmmaking. The stark differences in the development process require different ways to write animation in both film and television formats. This module explores how writers approach animated writing, the different tools they use, the ways that they mimic and depart from live-action narrative storytelling, and how the hugely popular world of animation is changing in a global marketplace.

The first video games of the 50s and 60s were text-based, and inherently carried the simple DNA of storytelling. In the present-day, video games present highly sophisticated stories that not only spin off into other formats like film and television, but often rival classic media for character and narrative complexity. Writing for games and other interactive media is the most differentiated from other forms of screenwriting, and this module will look at why that is, from non-linear structures and interactive gameplay to the game development process and the economic drivers pushing this youngest format into its first Golden Age of Storytelling.

How do I apply for Modern Screenwriting?
